Balletto del Granduca (The Grand Duke's Ballet)

Jan Pieterszoon Sweelinck 1562-1621

Sweelinck was organist at the Old Church in Amsterdam for some forty years. His compositional style influenced many composers. The "Balletto" is a set of variations based on a popular folk song of the day.

Toccata in E Minor

Johann Pachelbel 1653-1706

Pachelbel held many important church positions throughout Germany, including St. Stephen's, Vienna and ultimately, St. Sebald's in his native city of Nuremburg.

Presto - Concerto in F Major

George Frideric Handel 1685-1759

Born and educated in Germany, Handel traveled widely before going to London in 1710. His concertos, for organ and orchestra were used as interludes in performances of his oratorios. They lend themselves well to organ solo.

Voluntary in D

William Boyce 1710-1779

William Boyce was born in London and organist at the Royal Chapel. This is a typical voluntary of the 18th century; two movements, a slow, stately section followed by a faster section, usually involving dialogue style.

Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart 1756-1791

The Musical Clocks

Joseph Haydn 1732-1809

I Minuet (Song of the Quail)

These charming pieces were written in 1792 for a famous clock in Vienna. They were played automatically on a small flute organ operated by the clock mechanism. Beethoven, Mozart and Haydn all contributed compositions for musical clock performance.

Francis Hopkinson 1737-1791

Hopkinson was one of the signers of the Declaration of Independence. A lawyer by profession, he played the harpsichord and composed music. He generally is credited as being the first native American composer.

Andrew Clarke Born 1941

Andrew Clarke was born in Pittsfield and became organist and director at South Church. He was also founder and director of the Berkshire Concert Choir. Presently he is organist and choirmaster at Riverside Presbyterian Church, Jacksonville, Florida.

Variations on an American Hymn Tune (Nettleton)

Gordon Young Born 1919

A graduate of Curtis Institute, Gordon Young was on the faculty of the Detroit Institute of Musical Art for many years. He is a prolific composer, largely known for his choral and organ literature.
